CONDITIONS OF PLAY



LOCAL RULES

- Royal & Ancient Rules govern all play - except where modified by local rules.
- Out of bounds is defined by white stakes and/or white lines and boundary fences.
- Water hazards are defined by yellow stakes and/or yellow lines.
- Lateral hazards are defined by red stakes and/or red lines.
- Staked trees that interfere with a player's stance or area of intended swing. One club length from nearest point of relief, not nearer to the hole. No penalty.
- Chalet and Terrace Villa lawns are compulsory G.U.R. one club length from the nearest point of relief not nearer to the hole. No penalty.
- Bunkers - Due to Abnormal Ground Conditions (loss of sand), if the ball is in a bunker, the player may lift the ball and drop it, without penalty, in the bunker, on the nearest point of relief, but not nearer the hole, in a part of the bunker that affords maximum sand cover.
- Long Rough - Should a ball be lost in the long rough, relief should be taken at point of entry (nearest point of relief plus 2 club lengths) under penalty of one stroke.

COURSE ETIQUETTE

- Tidy golf attire must be worn at all times.
- Men - Golf shirt, dress trousers or shorts.
- Ladies - Golf shirt, dress trousers, shorts or skirt.
- Terrace Downs is a soft-spike only facility - metal spikes are not permitted.
- Slow play will not be tolerated - players should keep up to the group ahead of them.
- Please allow faster groups to play through. Speed of play: 18 holes - 4.5 hours; 9 holes - 2.25 hours.
- Please repair pitch marks, replace divots, and rake bunkers after use.

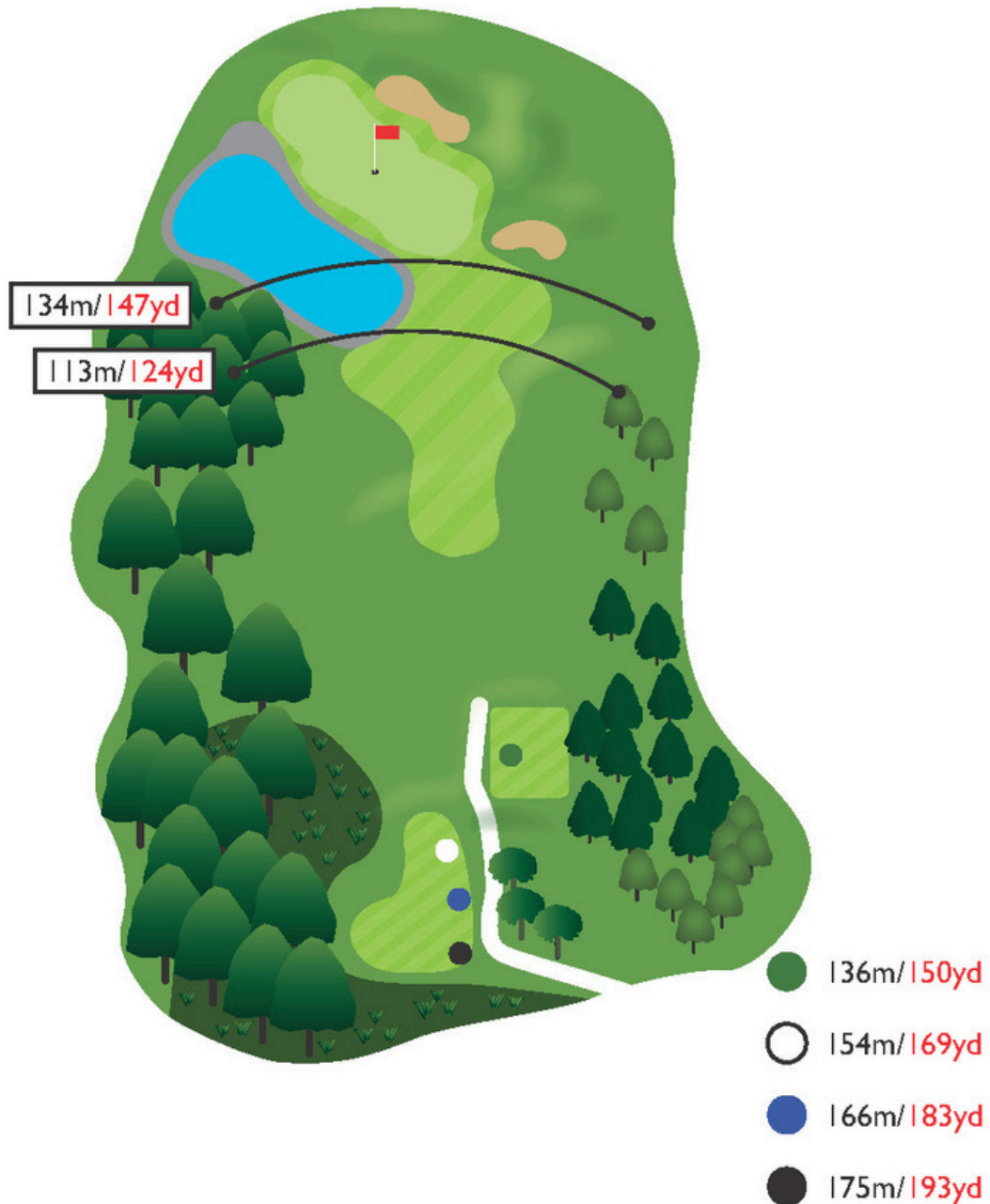

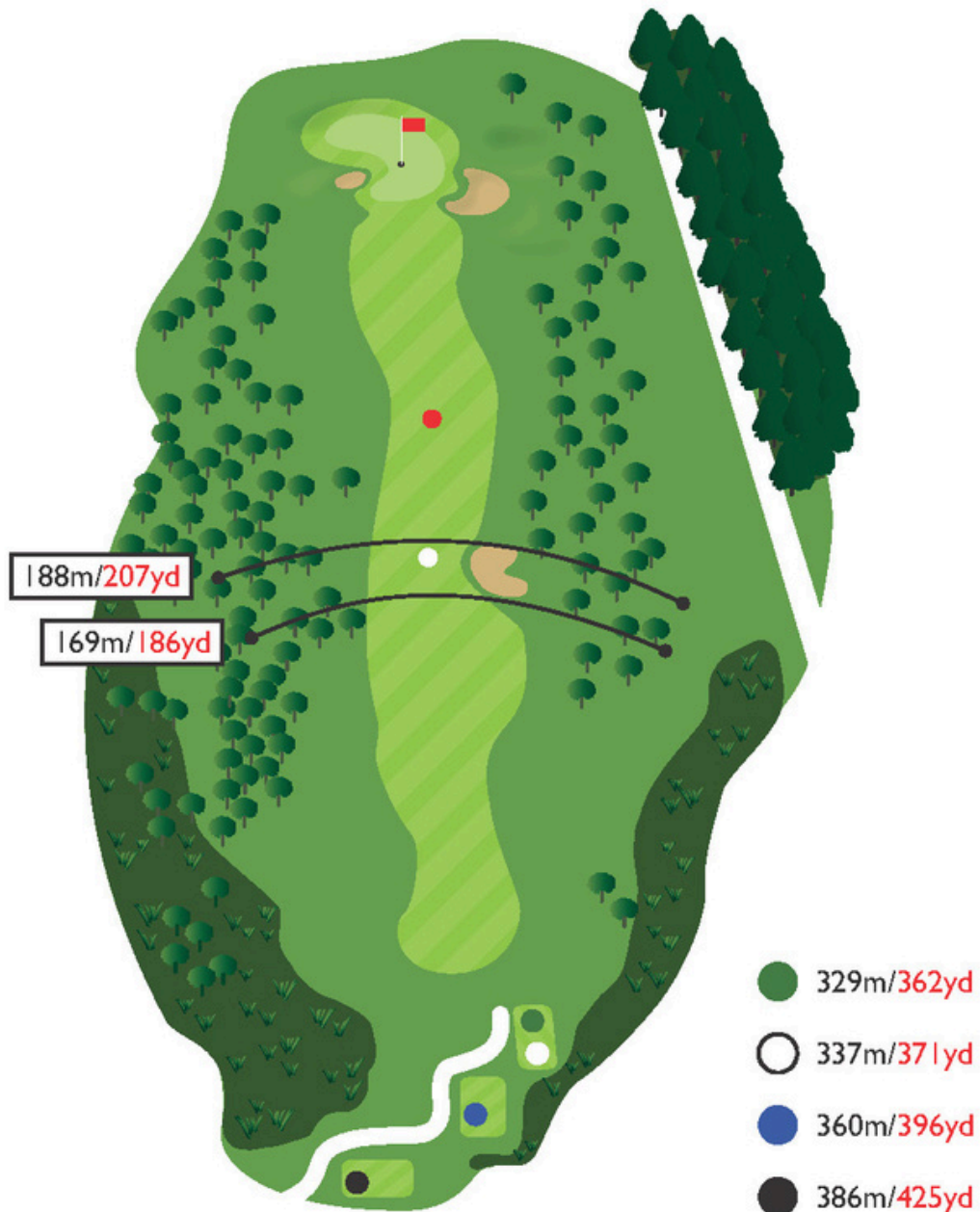


HOLE 1 PAR 5



A very demanding par five to begin your round with water lurking down the left of the entire fairway and coming into play from the tee. If you are brave and choose to bite off some of the dogleg, take your drive over the willow tree otherwise there is plenty of room to bail out to the right. If you are laying up with your second shot, beware that the fairway begins to narrow near the 100m marker.

HOLE 2 PAR 4



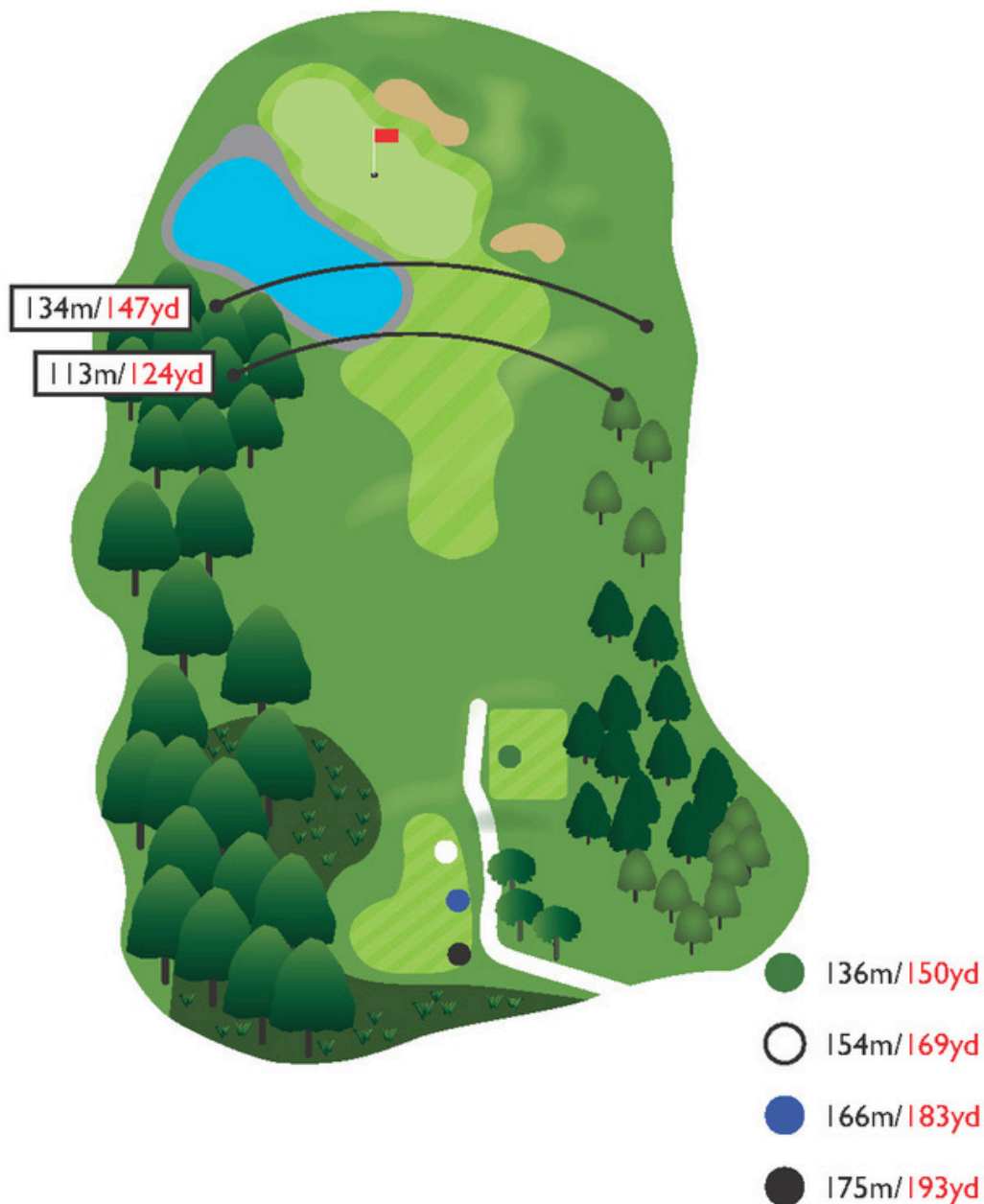
A sloping left to right fairway accompanied by the prevailing nor' westerly breeze brings the fairway bunker into play down the right side of the fairway. Finding the fairway is pivotal here, to give yourself the best chance to find the correct level of this crescent shaped green.

HOLE 3 PAR 4



A picturesque hole with Mt Hutt towering in the background. A tee shot directed away from the fairway bunker on the left should leave a relatively short and straightforward approach into an elevated green that will suck back any balls landing on the front of the green.

HOLE 4 PAR 3



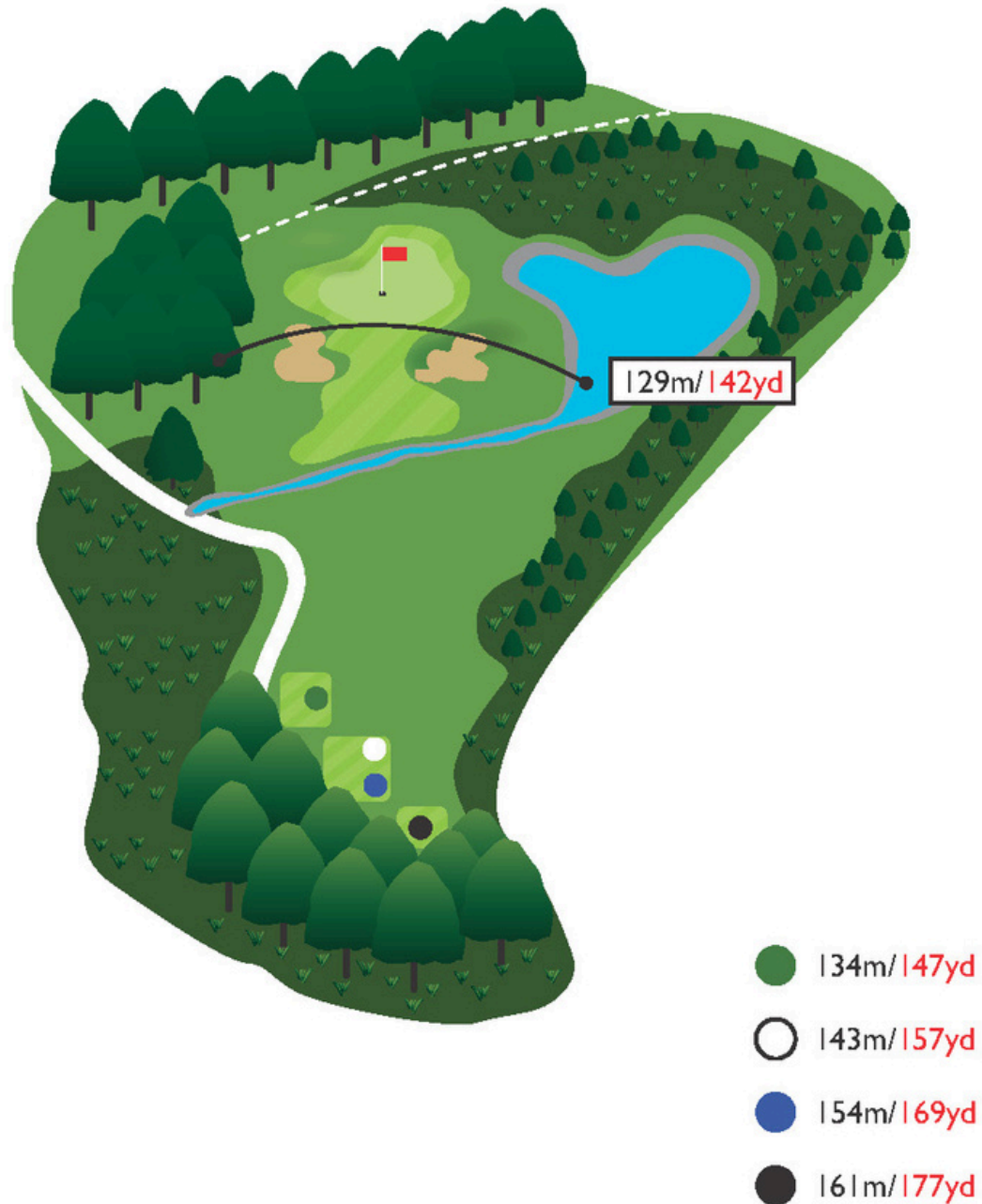
Correct club selection is absolutely essential to ensure you cover the lake and find the putting surface on this beautiful par three. Once on this challenging green, you can expect some very long and undulating putts depending on the pin position.

HOLE 5 PAR 4



A drive just right of the fairway bunkers should open the green up, but do not miss to far out to the right otherwise you may be blocked out and will be struggling with a long shot into this green. When playing your approach, avoid at all costs over shooting the green long or right or you will be left with a punishing up and down.

HOLE 6 PAR 3



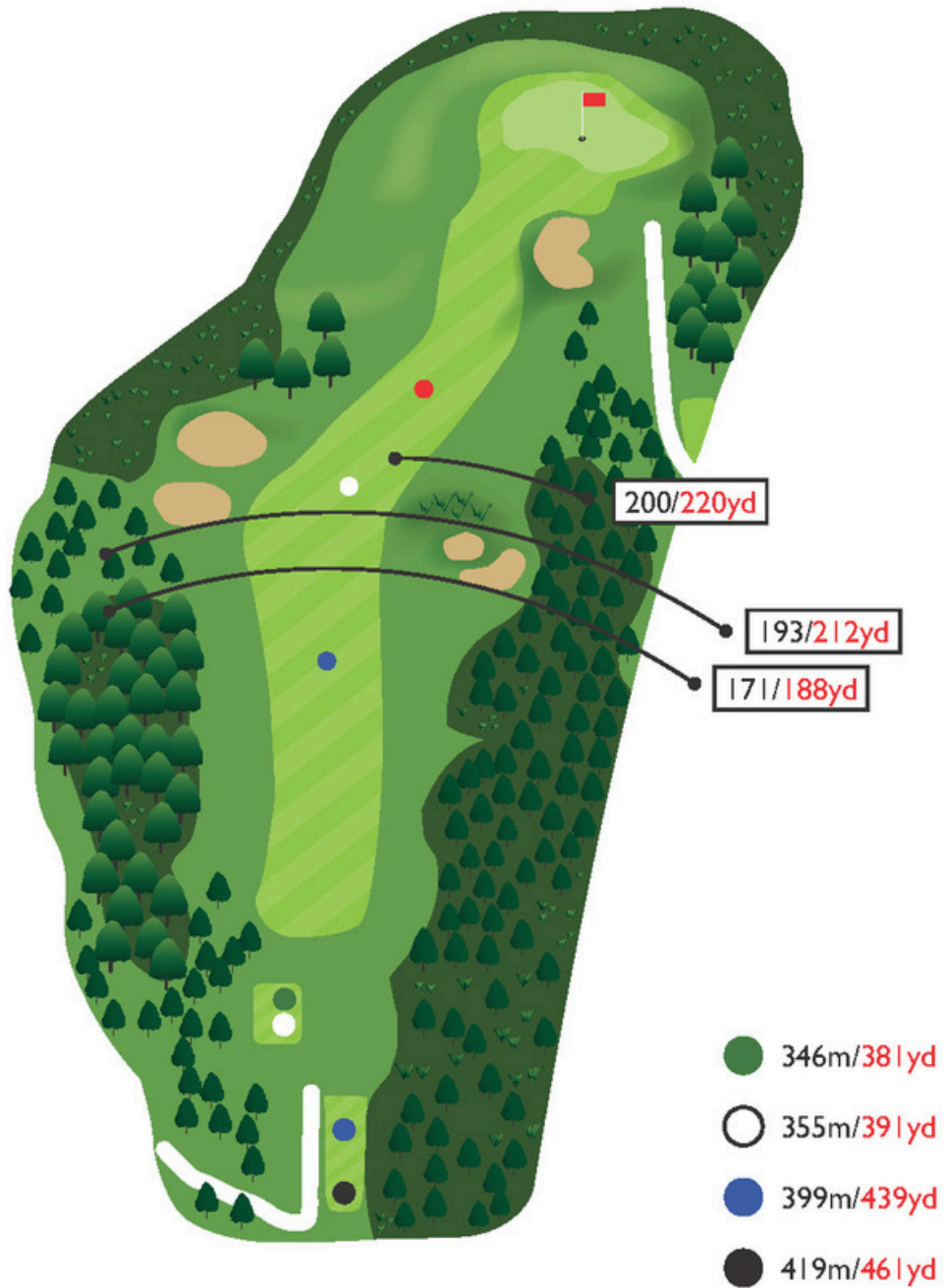
Though appearing straightforward from the tee, with a partially hidden lake lurking all along the right and two bunkers guarding an undulating green, this hole offers plenty of tricky pin positions to test players of all abilities.

HOLE 7 PAR 5



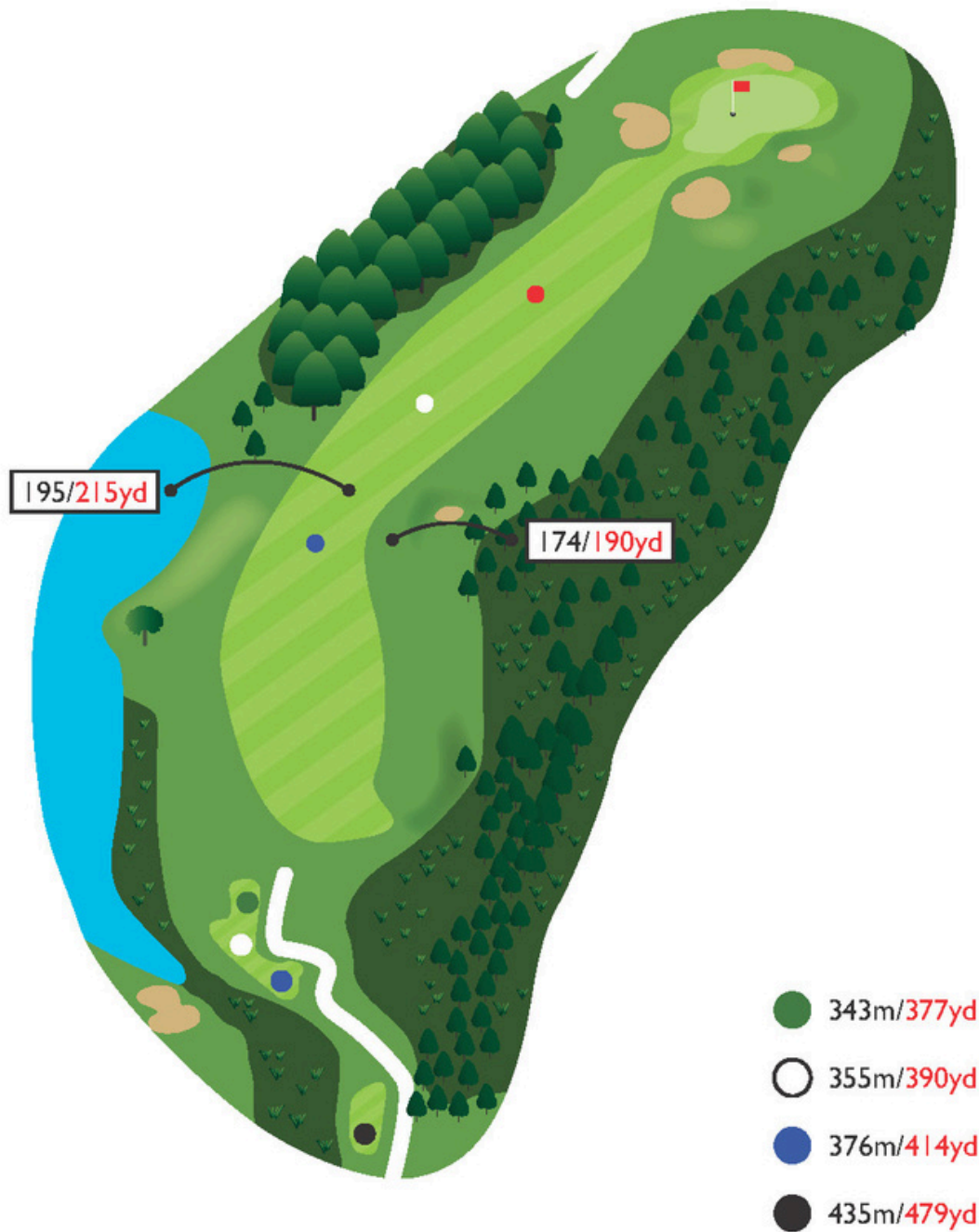
Your tee shot should be right of the bunkers to allow for a clear second shot. Avoid the lake on the right and the fairway bunker on the left. The wide but shallow green tends to kick balls from left to right.

HOLE 8 PAR₄



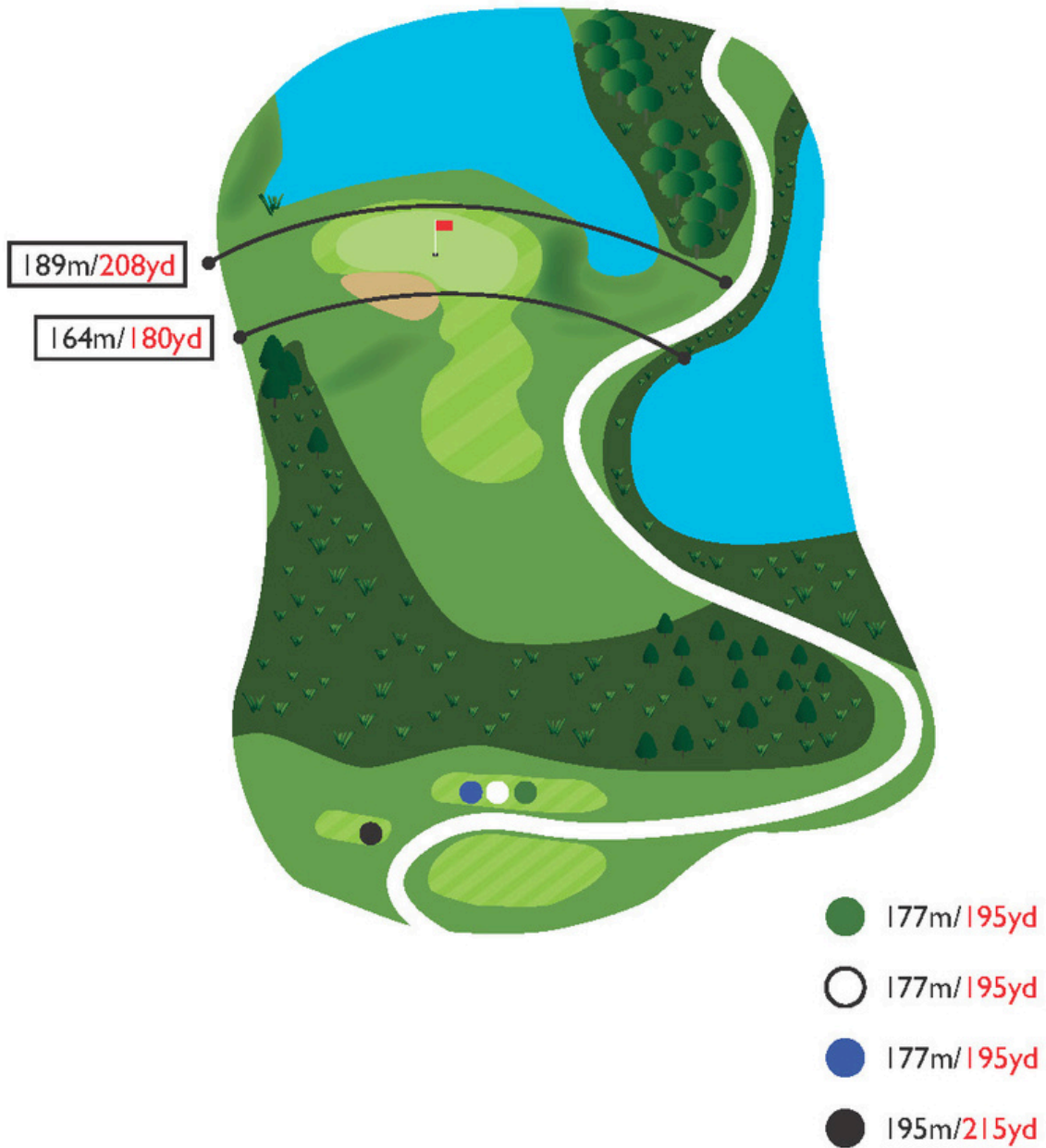
This hole requires two very good shots to reach the large two-tiered green. Check the distance of your second shot, as the front bunker is 20 meters short of the green and can be deceiving when judging your approach.

HOLE 9 PAR 4



Big hitters can cut the corner and clear the fairway bunker, however a drive just left of this line will leave a demanding second shot into a difficult sloping green from back to front. Once again long of this green is not the place to be and the greenside bunkers most notably the ones short and right will leave a challenging long bunker shot.

HOLE 10 PAR 3



Club selection is critical for this dramatic par three as you need to remember to take the elevation change into account. Short right is not a bad option for first time players of this hole. An attacking shot over the bunker is not for the faint hearted, especially with a clubhouse crowd behind you.

HOLE II PAR 4



The positioning of your tee shot is crucial on this impressive dogleg left par four. This may be the time to swallow your pride and leave the driver in the bag as the lake to the left and the lake at the end of the fairway will come into play with anything more than a long iron or fairway wood for many.

HOLE 12 PAR 5



Aim your tee shot at the right side of the fairway with a slight fade to avoid the lake and put yourself in good position to threaten the green with your second or to find the fat part of the fairway with a lay up, leaving a simple shot into the green.

HOLE 13 PAR 4



A very straightforward driving hole with the real challenge arriving when navigating a very long green which makes your approach shot look a lot shorter than it actually is. Despite this advice, whatever you do, do not go long.

HOLE 14 PAR 4



A tee shot directed at the right edge of the large fairway bunker should leave a short shot into a well bunkered green characteristic of two deep and unforgiving pot bunkers guarding the left side of the green. Caution is needed when playing to the sloping right side of the fairway, as balls tend to bounce and roll into the hazard.

HOLE 15 PAR 4



A great hole where big hitters can challenge the green with their tee shot. The safe play is to aim at the fairway bunkers down the left with a long iron or fairway wood. This should leave you a short pitch to the green and still a good chance at birdie.

HOLE 16 PAR 3



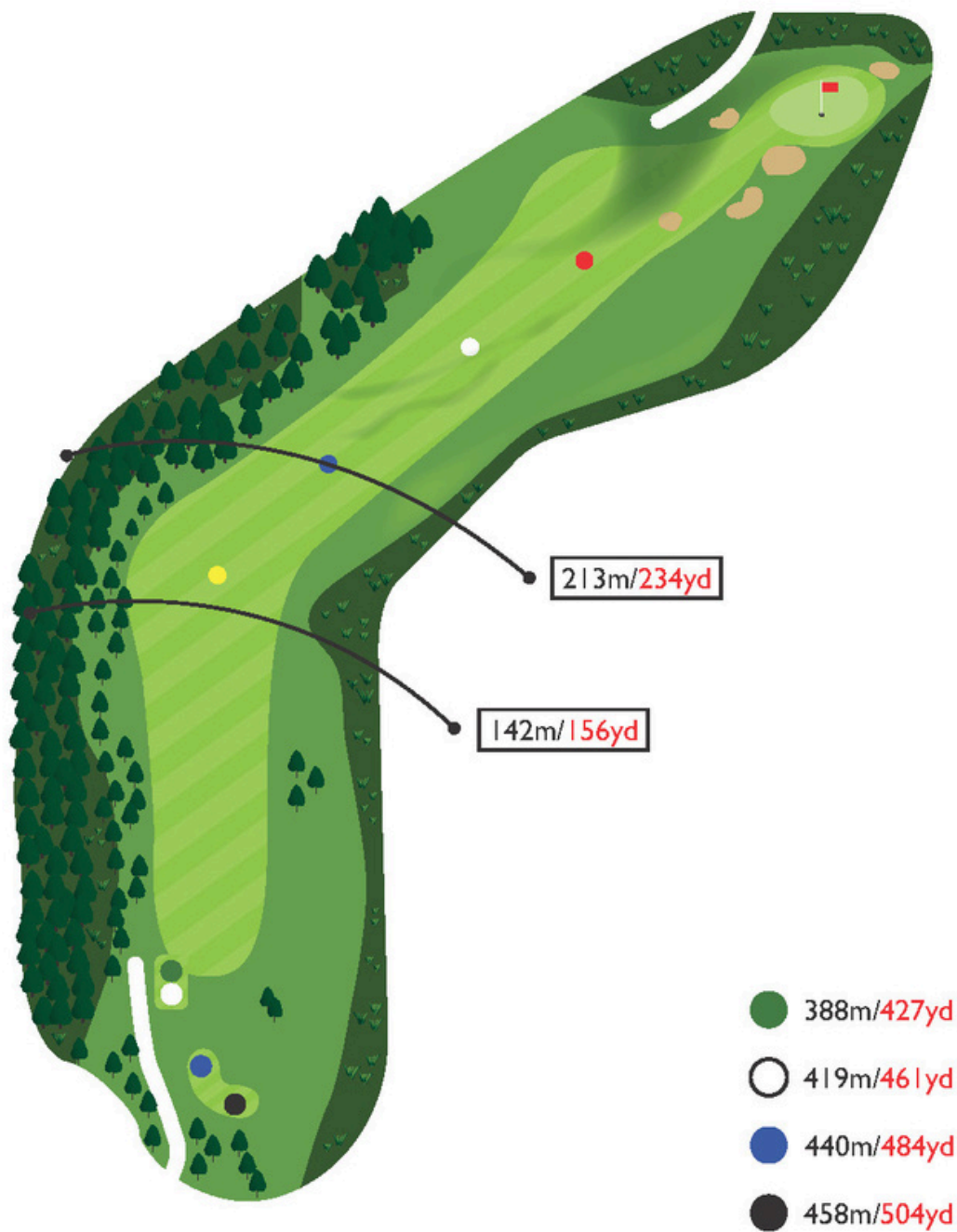
The scenery is breathtaking on this signature par three at Terrace Downs. Once you have taken in the astonishing views of the Rakaia Gorge below, steady yourself and ideally play a short shot onto the left side of the green as the green tilts to the right.

HOLE 17 PAR 4



The choice is yours whether to challenge the bunkers on the left side or play it safe down the wide fairway on the right. A solid drive can clear the bunkers and tussocks and also find the fairway, while the safer option will require a longer approach to a well protected green.

HOLE 18 PAR 5



A good tee shot over the right edge of the fairway will reward you with an opportunity to reach the green in two, provided you can navigate the various bunkers surrounding the green. Otherwise, lay up for an uphill approach to an obscured putting surface.
